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# Instructions for making a

## Mosaic Rainbow

### Equipment needed:

- 7 strips of rainbow coloured card
- 1 ruler
- 1 A4 sheet with rainbow outline
- 1 pencil (optional)
- 1 glue stick/pva glue
- 1 pair of scissors

### Safety Tip

(Adults – or older children supervising younger children):  
stay in sight of younger children when carrying out this activity to ensure glue does not end up in mouths and scissors are only used for cutting paper! Be extra careful with scissors if they are not rounded safety scissors (school style)

### Instructions:

- 1) Use a ruler to draw lines down the strips of rainbow coloured card
- 2) Being careful with the scissors, cut along the lines
- 3) Cut up all the small strips – you will have enough pieces of rainbow card to make lots of rainbows now if you wanted
- 4) Put the letters of the colours in the rainbow outline to remind you which colour goes where
- 5) Use the glue to stick down the coloured card – start at the top with red, then orange, yellow, green, blue, pinky/purple and purple
- 6) All done!

### Variation

Why not vary it a little? Cut your strips into triangles instead of squares, or, if you have little cut out stampers, you might want to make your strips of card into different shapes and stick all the shapes on the outline to make the rainbow.

Can you make a rainbow heart as another way to show that Jesus loves us and is the Light of the World?

### Wonder Zone: Star Biscuits: Shining bright, little lights.



9oz Plain flour, 8oz Butter or Margarine in small cubes

4 oz Sugar, ¼ teaspoon of Baking powder, ¼ teaspoon of salt

Sift the flour, salt, and baking powder into one bowl. In another bowl beat the sugar and butter together till light and fluffy. Then get an adult to help bring both together as a dough, this will take some time. Once brought together place in a sandwich bag and put in the fridge for at least an hour.

After an hour put your oven on at 170 if a fan oven or mark 3.

Take dough out of fridge and roll out on a clean board to an ¼ inch thick. Then using your star cutter cut out the stars and place on baking tray.

Place in the oven for 10- 15 minutes. Get an adult to check on the biscuits. Once cooked your adult can place the stars on a cooling rack and leave for at least 20 minutes.

Then maybe you could make those who care for you a drink and take them a shortbread star to bring a little light into their life!

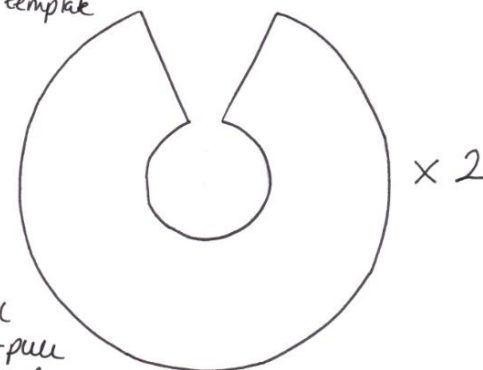
### Animal pompoms

#### You will need:

- 2 cardboard shapes – see template
- A pair of sharp scissors
- Wool, googly eyes, small pompoms

#### What to do:

- Wind wool around your shapes.
- Cut between the card (you may need a grown up to do this for you)
- Tie a shorter piece of wool between the card shapes – pull tightly + secure with a knot
- Decorate with eyes, small pompoms...

## Thank you God for Bees

### What you will need:

- Hollow plant stems/bamboo
- Garden twine or string
- An empty 500ml plastic drinks bottle
- A pair of scissors and some secateurs
- A piece of paper, half A4
- Crayons or felt pens or coloured biros



Bee hotels are used by solitary bees who like cavity nesting such as the Mason bee, the leafcutter bee and the yellow faced bees. They will lay their eggs in the tubes then seal the end. If it is a leaf cutter bee with a piece of leaf cut into an almost exact circle!



### How to do it

- Using the scissors carefully cut the top off the bottle.
- Collect up your tubes and sticks, you should have 8 tubes for the bees to nest in and some extra sticks to fit in the bottle.
- Check your sticks are the correct length if any stick out of the bottle a long way trim them shorter with secateurs, maybe mum or dad could help.
- Tie your sticks together in a bundle
- Draw a design on your paper to make it 'your ' Bee hotel.
- Insert your paper as a cylinder into the bottle.
- Add your bundle of sticks down the middle.
- Tie a length of string around the outside of the bottle.
- Find a place to carefully hang it

Bees like to be 1 metre at least off the ground, facing south, fairly sheltered near some flowers. The bottle needs to be hung slightly pointing down so it does not fill with water.

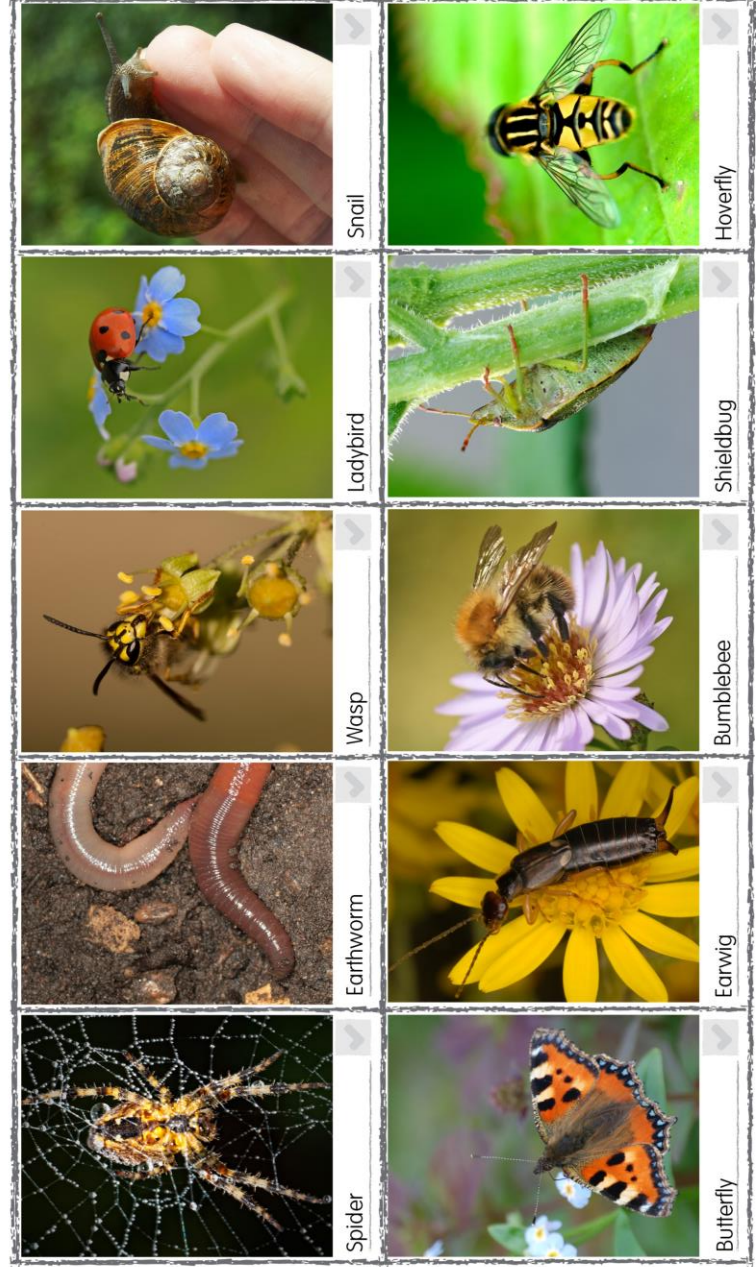
